Strong Action to Protect Our Environment

Warwick has 39 miles of coastline, making our community particularly susceptible to the impact of sea rise and climate change. As we've seen in areas like Buttonwoods, Nausauket and City Park, rising water levels and increasingly intense storm surges regularly damage homes, businesses and infrastructure.

I am very proud that we passed the Act on Climate this year, one of the most influential environmental bills approved by the legislature in decades. It addresses climate change and ensures that our state is prepared for an economy that is shifting to adapt to clean technology.

Major Steps Taken to Address Housing Crisis

When I became Speaker, I pledged to make housing my top priority, and I'm very pleased this has been a productive legislative session for housing issues. We:

- Established the state's first permanent funding stream for affordable housing to help address Rhode Island's critical housing shortage;
- Passed a new law to prohibit housing discrimination against those who receive government assistance to pay their rent;
- Launched a five-year pilot program to create supportive housing for 125 chronically homeless Rhode Islanders; and
- Created the position of "housing czar" to oversee housing initiatives and develop housing plans for the state.

Providence Journal, wrote: "Thanks to a comprehensive package of budget investments and legislation, a strong foundation has now been laid to make real progress towards providing all our residents with the housing options they need to safely and affordably house their families and thrive economically."

There's still much more work to be done, but we've already made great progress.

Budget Phases Out Car Tax, Invests in Recovery

I am immensely proud of the two budgets we passed this year, which addressed the most important needs in our state while making no broad-based tax increases. We preserved and strengthened services that help the most vulnerable, while making investments to aid in the economic recovery for the business community.

The budgets continued the phase-out of the car tax, and after next year's budget is enacted, the car tax will be completely eliminated for all Rhode Islanders. The budget also paid back all of the funding borrowed from the state's rainy day fund early in the pandemic. We included \$10 million above the Governor's request for the Department of Children Youth and Families to hire more than 90 new workers to address ongoing issues.

I'd rather use a federal dollar instead of a state dollar anywhere I can, and we did just that: we leveraged available federal funding to stretch our investments in areas like infrastructure and education even further.

Making Key Investments in Higher Education

One of the best investments we can make to help people achieve their goals is to give them access to a college education, which is the pathway to a brighter future.

This year, we permanently enacted the Rhode Island Promise program, which provides up to two years of free tuition for income eligible in-state students at Community College of Rhode Island. More than 800 Warwick students have benefitted from the Promise program since its launch three years ago.

We also funded an additional \$5.9 million beyond the Governor's budget request to assist Rhode Island College. Earlier this year, voters approved bond issues we placed on the ballot that included funding for a fine arts center at URI, a science building at RIC and renovations to CCRI's campuses.

Strengthening Care, Services for Seniors

Rhode Island's nursing home residents deserve the best care and our nursing home staff deserve the supports they need to make this happen. We enacted legislation to strengthen staffing standards and funding for direct care staff to improve the quality of care for the vulnerable and elderly, who were particularly at risk during the COVID crisis. We committed more than \$21 million to assist in this effort.

We also passed a law to assure that families of nursing home residents can be visited by family members or caregivers even during declared emergencies.

To address those that prey upon the elderly, we adopted a new law requiring financial institutions to report suspected exploitation of seniors.

The state budget included robust funding for the Pilgrim Senior Center to continue vital services for Warwick seniors.

Expanding Heath Coverage, Lowering Drug Costs

As leaders, we continuously strive to address the rising costs of health care and prescription drugs. *This year, we passed a law to require health insurers to cover colorectal cancer screenings, which is truly life-saving preventative care.* This is in addition to my legislation enacted a few years ago which requires insurers to cover all costs related to mastectomies.

Regarding prescription drugs, we required pharmacists to provide information to consumers about less expensive prescription options which may be available to them, and we made certain that insured patients *can no longer be charged more than \$40 per month for insulin used to treat diabetes*.

Warwick: A Great Place To Live and Work

I am one of many people who have lived in Warwick my entire life. I love our beautiful beaches and parks, and fantastic restaurants and shops. Warwick is a community where working families can afford to buy a good home, send their children to quality schools and access employment.

Warwick received \$40.2 million in education aid in the current state budget, up from \$38.7 million in 2020, enabling local property taxes to remain stable. This year's state budget includes \$13 million in tax relief for Warwick vehicle owners.

As we look to invest the influx of federal funding coming to our state, I pledge to continue working closely with my colleagues in state and city government to ensure an even brighter future for our great city.
